Introducing basic terminology of mathematics and general engineering.</p> <p>Grammar:</p> <p>Developing B2/C1 level grammar structures essential for written and verbal communication.</p> <p>Writing:</p> <p>Practising skills in writing various formal and informal texts such as reports, emails, CVs, notes, instructions, descriptions of processes.</p> <p>Reading:</p> <p>Developing various reading techniques indispensable for dealing with general and professional texts.</p> <p>Listening:</p> <p>Developing listening comprehension skills necessary in workplace and everyday life situations such as telephone conversations, interviews, customer service communication, lectures and presentations.</p> <p>Speaking:</p> <p>Practising general and specialist language communication skills such as presenting arguments, solving problems, participating in case studies, holding formal and informal conversations and job interviews. Practising the correct pronunciation and intonation of expressions.</p>
